Marilyn Medén and Friends On this Sunday—so close

after Christmas, and the last Sunday of our theme, Story—we will listen to, read, and interpret stories that illustrate our principles, arrive from many sources, and end well. It will be a joyous, and yet serious; interactive, and yet personal; relaxing, and yet engaging time.

A Time for Love. A Time for Hope.



This December as the shops fill with gifts shouting to be bought, and the fliers spill over the door steps, and at the same time as the world reels from the madness of incomprehensible acts of violence, I ask you to pause. We need to all just stop for a moment or a day and drop our shoulders and soften

our breaths and take time to reintroduce ourselves to what really matters to us. Surely what matters to us is how we live from that which we hold most worthy.

I cannot tell you what that is for you. Only you know. Whatever you know to be your highest good, your deepest longing, your purest dream, your fullest ideal, surely now is the time to mark every one of your actions with it.

There is a lot to avoid on the television and social media. It can be an amplifier of fear and hatred and a platform for a lot of really stupid people. And like real life, one can come across stories of pure beauty, stories of radiant humanity. In the wake of the bombings last month I have been lifted up by the brilliant audacious courage of some of my fellow humans. Two true stories:

A young bearded man stood on a city street corner, eyes covered by a scarf, his arms wide open. At his feet he had


two signs. On one sign he had written. "I am a Muslim. I am labeled a terrorist." On the other sign he wrote; "I trust you. Do you trust me? Hug me." He stood there waiting, vulnerable and unseeing. What would you have done? Walk by? After a few tense moments, someone hugged him, then another person and another, male and female, young and old, every race walked into his embrace, and our hearts were made whole.

In the Paris subway, two days after the bombing, three friends stood together holding hands: one was Canadian, one was Syrian, one was French. The sign in front of them said, "Love over Fear. We cannot be separated". Their simple message was profoundly moving. In deciding to take this stand for love and friendship, they broke the spell of fear that had hung over Paris after 129 people had been killed. We are entering the season of love and hope, which is meaningless unless we too choose to take a stand for our ideals. May this be a season for love. May this be a season for hope.

May you and your families have the opportunity to strengthen the love in the world this December.

Social Media Policy

Beacon Unitarian Church supports the use of social media (Facebook, Blogging, Twitter, etc). Social media may be used to promote Beacon Unitarian Church and/ or to share information, ideas and/or opinions regarding Beacon. Members and congregants will adhere to the following guidelines:

- 1. Permission in writing will be secured prior to posting on the internet or publicly, any pictures or videos in which anyone can be identified.
- 2. All postings will be respectful and in alignment with Unitarian Principles.
- Any inappropriate use of social media (harmful, illegal, bullying, harassing, or containing ethnic, racial, religious or sexual slurs) which may be associated with Beacon, will be dealt with by the Minister, a Religious Education Director or a member of the Board of Directors. At the discretion of the Beacon representative, the person doing the posting will be requested in writing to either remove the offending posting entirely, or to edit

the posting to include a statement that it does not represent Beacon Unitarian Church.

- Immediate attention will be given to social media which is likely to harm children, youth or the vulnerable elderly.
- Beacon pledges to respond to all parties respectfully, with sensitivity and confidentiality.
- All congregants and staff of Beacon will be informed of this policy annually, in September. Notification/information may be by newsletter and/or email tree and/or posting at church.

Advocacy Letter Procedure

If any Beacon Social Justice task group/committee wishes to formulate an advocacy letter to be sent on behalf of Beacon, a draft of the letter will first come to the Board for approval. The resulting approved letter will be read to the congregation during a church service or a church event and be available for signatures after church or the event. All letters should be guided by our Unitarian principles.

ogether we have reached our pledge target of \$85,000. Your Stewardship Committee, together with the Board, worked hard to present the draft budget in such a way as to inspire our congregation. We also worked hard to transform our relationship to the Stewardship Drive. I say we succeeded. Well done to all of us. Thank you so much for your generosity and your commitment to Beacon.

For those of you who are curious about such things, 87% of our congre-

gation responded to the Stewardship Drive by making a financial pledge to Beacon for 2016 and several people pledged for the very first time. Our median pledge remained the same at \$600 and our average pledge dropped slightly by \$94. We received 66 pledges this year compared with 56 pledges last year. We have more people using PADs this year, more people turning in post-dated cheques, and more Transfers of Investments than we have had in previous years. This provides a

greater level of fiscal certainty to the Board and the work of our church.

On our Stewardship poster, all of the jars are filled—and we've added one more jar, in case there are those who still want to pledge.

You may be wondering what these numbers might mean about Beacon. I say they represent a clarity of understanding of the work that we do to transform people's lives. I say they represent the value and the importance that our congregants place on the work and the fellowship of our church. I say they indicate the power in our community which we can harvest together. And I say the numbers reflect the leadership of our minister and our lay leaders at Beacon as well.

May this be the launching of a new story in the life of Beacon Unitarian Church.

Sponsoring a Refugee Family

Beacon is moving forward in its plans to sponsor a refugee family. Background research has been in process to determine the many aspects of this venture. Considerations are broad including the logistics of acquiring a family, the church's responsibilities, fundraising and settlement issues, among others.

The Beacon planning committee recommends that we sponsor a family of four from any of the countries that fall under the umbrella of concern for United Nations High Commission on Refugees (UNHCR). While Syrian refugees certainly do merit consideration, the Beacon Steering Committee felt refugees from other countries should not be overlooked.

Our commitment as a church would be to provide for "our family" for one year. Research indicates that we would need approximately \$50,000 in funds to do this, particularly as living in this general area is costly. The expectation is that the family would likely settle in New Westminster, Coquitlam, North Surrey or North Burnaby.

The amount of \$15,000 is the estimated fundraising goal for the church. The expectation is that we could look to the wider community for donations. A generous anonymous donor has agreed to match funds brought in by Beacon—up to \$20,000. In addition, the federal government will subsidize approximately half of the cost of sponsorship because we would be taking a "Blended Visa-Office Referred" family (BVOR). It has been decided that we would not go forward with the sponsorship plan until 80% of the funds are in place.

When we give the green light, a family could be here in less than six weeks! So we must be ready. The Beacon Sponsorship group is to be a Constituent Group under CUC (which is a Sponsorship Agreement Holder), a designation that allows us to cut through a lot of red tape. There are many settlement issues, including finding temporary housing for a family for a minimum of one month, but possibly as long as three months. At that point, it's expected that the family find housing that suits it with our

help. Settlement issues are wide ranging, including everything from house furnishings to schooling, medical attention to acculturation, and more.

There is a lot of work to be done. Experienced sponsors have suggested that a group of twenty people is necessary to successfully take on this commitment. The Refugee Sponsorship Group have been keeping a list of those who have stepped forward offering help. Nancy Rupert is the point person for Settlement plans and Susan Millar for fund-raising. Please let them know if you can offer help. The full group also consists of Terry McComas, Carol Woodworth, Lynne Rhead, and Rev. Debra Thorne (a non-voting member).

On Sunday, December 6th, the Committee will be providing a more detailed outline of the plans to Church Members. Prior to taking a vote of support from members, we will answer questions about this undertaking.


