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Board Bitz

oday's Board Bitz entry will be a bit of an anomaly. Rather than telling you of Board initiatives in the past month, I will be saluting you, the congregation, for accomplishments that you began, independent of the Board. Around the beginning of the month, in quick succession, Beaconites first signed up to be a co-sponsor of Vancouver's Global Climate Change March, which was held on November 29, to demonstrates citizen commitment around the world for the meeting of world leaders, starting the following day, to work towards developing agreements to reduce carbon dioxide emissions and climate change.

The march began with welcoming speeches by a number of Indigenous leaders, which I found highly appropriate, as we were standing on unceded First Nations land, in front of Vancouver's Art Gallery. Also, it is

increasingly clear that legal action by First Nations, who have been denied meaningful consultation, is becoming one of our best methods of halting industrial mega-projects that lack public support. The day was cool, but brilliantly sunny. Marchers from Beacon brought our new flag, which served well as an effective re-grouping focus, whenever we became separated by the surging crowd. We stood by our colleagues from Unitarian Church of Vancouver, North Shore Unitarian and South Fraser Unitarian.

I must confess that I hogged the flag but, truth be known, I didn't even notice its weight, given my deep pride at Beacon's energy and integrity.

Only a week later, at a congregational meeting, our members unanimously chose to sponsor a refugee family. Once again, you all placed my buttons in severe danger of pridedriven popping. That project, too, is

Climate Change Covenant Group

After Paris COP21—how are we feeling about climate change? What thoughts do we have about it?

A nnouncing the formation of a Covenant Group convened to explore thoughts and feelings related to climate change (co-sponsored by Beacon Climate Change Task Force & UCV Covenant Groups.)

The group will meet on the first Wednesdays of the month (Jan 6, Feb 3, Mar 2, Apr 6 and May 4), from 6:30–8 pm. We will meet at Waves coffee shop on Columbia (715 Columbia) in New Westminster, 2 blocks from the New West Skytrain Station.

The Climate Change Covenant Group will be open for the first two sessions, however, after the 2nd session, no new members will be added.

Following "covenant group" processes, the group will be "mostly listening" as people share in a respectful and compassionate circle. The focus will be to provide an opportunity for each person to speak and be heard, and each session will include a reading and questions to consider.

The series will culminate in a group decision and action to carry out a project as a group.

1st Session: Listening (led by Teresa Morton) **2nd Session:** Principles of Active Hope, based on work by Joanna Macy & Chris Johnstone (led by Mary Bennett)

She's an experienced facilitator, a visual artist and a community catalyst. Her work life included working as Executive Director of the Canadian Unitarian Council.

Mary and Teresa have been friends and colleagues for over twenty years. They meet weekly to create art together and their conversations are wide-ranging.




