Minister's Message



This month Unitarians across Canada are speaking out on the Trans-Pacific Pipeline and on a National Affordable Housing Strategy. I am using my message space this month to share with you two public letters. One was a statement calling upon Prime Minister Justin Trudeau to reject the Trans-

The second letter I encourage you to send to your MP, and the Honourable Jean-Yves Duclos, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development, as the government is working on a National Housing Policy at this moment. The Unitarian Church of Ottawa and the Vancouver Unitarian Church have been working hard for years to prod the government into creating a National Housing Policy. It is time that all Canadians had access to safe affordable housing.

e, the members of the Unitarian Universalist Ministers of Canada, call upon Prime Minister Trudeau to reject the Trans-Pacific Partnership. The TPP, if approved, would prevent Canada from protecting our environment.

In 2012 the Province of Quebec placed a moratorium on fracking due to mounting concerns that the toxic process of extracting natural gas is a threat to community drinking water. In retaliation the oil company operating in Quebec used the NAFTA agreement (which TPP would strengthen) to sue Canada for \$250,000,000 in lost future profits.

Under NAFTA corporate lawyers in Washington and New York are dictating to our Parliament what it can and cannot legislate. Canada is currently facing \$2.6 billion in lawsuits from corporations because of environmental legislation allegedly interfering with profit-making of foreign corporations. TPP will include more countries. Our Parliament will be receiving instructions from Tokyo.

To the Honourable Jean-Yves Duclos, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development

s a Unitarian Universalist, I believe that decent and affordable housing is a basic human right. Our Unitarian Universalist principles call us to uphold the inherent worth and dignity of all peoples, and to work for justice, equity and compassion in human relations. Specifically, our resolution of 2010 called for "public policies to address and overcome disparities between rich and poor," in order to ensure secure, adequate, accessible and affordable housing for Canadians (http://cuc.ca/resolutions-2010-affordable-housing).

At this time, we commend the federal government for initiating its consultations on a national housing strategy. We are pleased that work on this crucial area of national, provincial and municipal social and economic policy has finally begun.

We believe that adequate and affordable housing is a basic human right; this fundamental principle should guide the national housing strategy process, its vision, themes, and outcomes. Furthermore, we affirm that the strategy must give priority to ensuring the availability of secure, adequate, accessible and affordable housing to those without housing and to members of groups particularly vulnerable to homelessness and marginal housing conditions.

We implore you to use the attached analysis and recommendations of our Poverty Awareness Working Group of the First Unitarian Congregation of Ottawa to help inform and inspire the creation of a truly just, equitable and effective national housing strategy that will enable Canadians to access secure housing they can afford, and that meets their needs.

If September started the church year off in a positive way, October followed up with lots of business for the Board to consider, and good work to do.

We began with a request from the New Westminster Homelessness Coalition for Beacon to become an official member. The Coalition is a group of representatives from various organizations in New Westminster who meet quarterly to discuss and share information. Membership is \$5.00 a year. The Board voted to become a member. David Kristjanson is our temporary liaison and we are wondering if this is a position someone from the congregation would like to take on.

Next, we reviewed the minutes of the June Coordinating Council and set a date for our next bi-annual meeting. We will meet on Nov. 15th from 3–5 pm at the Minister's office. Each Beacon committee is asked to send a representative to the meeting to share what is happening in their committee and to take back to their members the information shared by other committees.

Given the July resignation of Terry McComas from the Refugee Task Force, the Board of Directors and Beacon membership, the Board decided to send Terry a letter thanking him for his considerable contributions to Beacon and wishing him the best.

The Board then accepted a motion by the Refugee Task Force to disband the Task Force, as their primary mission of bringing a Beacon sponsored refugee family to Canada has been accomplished. The Settlement Team, headed by Nancy Rupert, Marilyn Meden and Carol Woodworth, will take on the responsibilities of financial management and reporting to the Board and the CUC. There are other Beacon members who are also

members-at-large of the Team and they are all working hard to help the Al Rbaai family settle into their new home here in New Westminster.

Our next board meeting will be Nov. 13th. By this time, the Stewardship Drive will be complete and we will have had our Congregational Budget meeting. It will be time for us all to be looking to the new year and all the joys and challenges it will bring.

Please consider pledging generously to Beacon. We are a remarkable community and totally self-funded. If you haven't already picked up the information provided by the Stewardship Committee, please do so, to see where all the money goes. Beacon is a good investment in your community.


own! The book features favourite recipes of Beacon members and friends. Money raised will be used towards a social justice project.


Beacon Writers' Group: Sat. Nov. 19



2017 Hungary/Transylvania Choir Tour and Unitarian Pilgrimage


