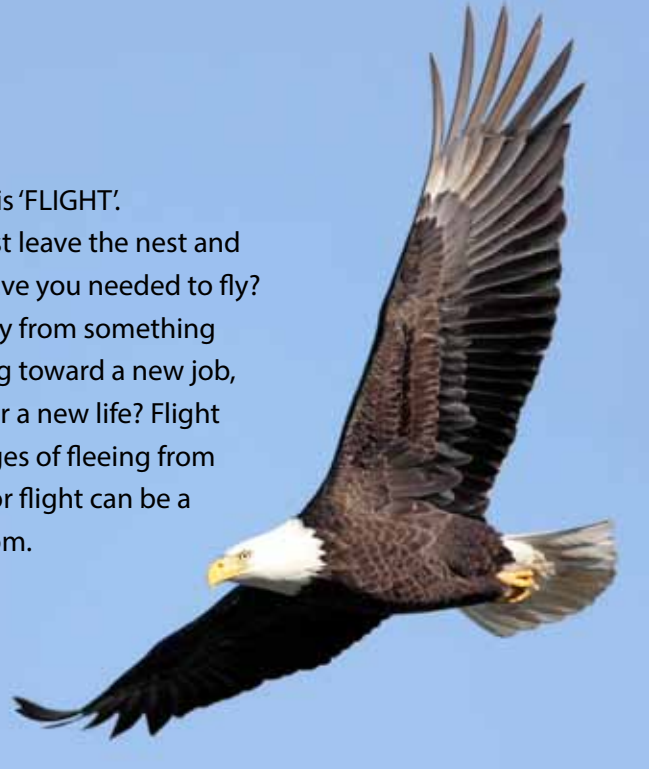

Minister's Message

The last month of our 2016–17 church year is already upon us. What a year it has been! This time last year many of us were standing in the international arrivals area at the airport waiting excitedly to greet the Al Rbaai family. The work done by the Refugee Taskforce in preparation for that day was huge. The learning was just beginning. In the past twelve months the community has learned how challenging it is to communicate across the barriers of language and culture. We have also had to grapple with our hope and expectations when faced with the realities of homesickness and family separation, the strangeness of a regular school schedule, unexpected and anticipated medical needs and the red tape of bureaucracy. There has also been the satisfaction that each day the challenges for the Al Rbaai's have gotten a little easier, a little less confusing, a little less overwhelming. Please read the article on page five by April Hope, who has collected sage wisdom from helping Unitarian congregations from across Canada sponsor refugee families.

In this past year we saw a new group launched at Beacon. The Writer's Group arose out of a conversation between Janet Pivnick and Marilyn Medén, and typifies what I admire about the Beacon community—they just make it happen!

It has been a year of stresses and strains for some of our leadership. Yet Beacon is nothing if not resilient in the face of loss and change. I commend the hard working board for the work done this year. At this time last year, Beacon was anxiously waiting for “a refugee family from Syria”. People that we did not know. It seemed that they would never get here—hold up after hold up. And now, a year later we celebrate the one year anniversary of our friends, the Al Rbaai family, arriving in Canada. The family is settling in, the children are going to school and all are learning to speak English. Time flies.

Now another small group of thoughtful, committed people from Beacon are working to change the world again by bringing more of the family to Canada. More information to come as this all progresses.

Planning has now started for the

2018 BC Regional Spring Gatherings. The CUC is looking at having three gatherings, probably in May, with one in the Lower Mainland, one on Vancouver Island and one in the Interior. As part of this planning we held a sticker vote after Church on Sunday May 14th on possible theme ideas. *Love and Justice* received 4 votes, *Environment* received 8 votes, *Truth Healing and Reconciliation* received 12 votes, *Congregation Size Concerns* received 3 votes and *Doing Church Differently* received 11 votes. The board will pass these results on to the CUC so they can add them to the information received from other BC congregations. We should be hearing more about the 2018 Spring Regional

Gatherings over the next few months.

The board is currently reviewing Beacon’s Safe Congregation Plan and updating our list of congregation members who have first aid training. If you have first aid training, please email David at davidhardy@telus.net. Let us know what kind of training you have and we will add you to the list. Thank you in advance for helping us keep this information current.

Please RSVP with what you would like to bring—appetizer, main dish, salad/vegetable dish or dessert. Also, choose between “everyday” Canadian fare (e.g. potato salad, deviled eggs, etc.) or the cooking style of the Al Rbaai family who choose to follow their religion's guidelines for cooking and eating.

The family prefers Halal meat, from animals which are killed in a certain way, and butchered according to strict guidelines. No gelatin or alcohol can be used, including flavourings. Peggy has some vanilla paste which she has volunteered to share for baking. The family doesn't eat dairy due to food sensitivity.

Vegan recipes would work well as would vegetable dishes and salads.

The family, among many other things, is improving their English. Nader is enjoying his English lessons three evenings a week. Taghreed was hesitant about learning, but enjoys visits from Meghan and Marylke. Her comprehension has increased, in fact, she doesn't hesitate to try English now, and this is a big step for her. Raneem is learning grammar and vocabulary. In her latest English lesson she wrote about foods in Syria and Jordan, reviewed items found in her kitchen, played a game matching opposites, and answered questions that reviewed prepositions (between, across from, and around the corner from). New words are “delicious” and “neighbours”. She has just begun to learn the names of continents and countries. Raneem is learning, not just English, but to be responsible for doing some homework. Mohammad, after a difficult beginning, now enjoys kindergarten, has made considerable progress, and stays at school until dismissal at 2:53 pm.

Refugee Sponsorship

Beacon's Refugee Sponsorship Taskforce (#1) is preparing to celebrate the Al Rbaai family's first year in Canada, and the Taskforce's two years of preparation and support. The following article was posted by April Hope who is the CUC contact and co-ordinator for Unitarian Sponsorship's in Canada. It was thought that this overview was realistic and helpful and in some ways reflective of some of the challenges that Beacon's Sponsorship has had.

Refugee sponsorship is not always a piece of cake, a bed of roses, or even what we had hoped it might be. Sponsorship is kind of like raising a child from 0–20 years

of age, in 12 months flat! Except that you are dealing with someone who speaks another language, comes from a different culture, and is not in fact a child at all.

A good sponsor, like a good parent, needs to teach a newcomer to be self-sufficient and thrive without them. Before a newcomer arrives, we hope, we pray, we believe they will settle and be successful in our community. We have a list from the government that tells us how they can be successful: learn French or English, manage bank accounts, pay taxes, find employment, attend school and more. We dream, surely, “my newcomer” will do all of these things and more!

Then reality hits...they aren't picking up the language, they want to move to a different city, they want to go back home, they don't understand the importance of following Canadian laws, they want to do everything or nothing on their own, they resent not supporting themselves, they are scared. We think, how will we ever help them become self-sufficient?

We may need to manage our own expectations. For a family having dealt with very severe trauma or living with daunting health issues, even

learning a new language in one year may only be a dream. Sometimes, you will have to set aside the list of things that “should” be done and simply help them through a difficult day.

Alternatively, the newcomer who expects to find work or start a business within weeks or months after arrival may feel disappointed and frustrated because they are not able to provide the same lifestyle they were accustomed to in their home country.

We may need to manage our own expectations. For a family having dealt with very severe trauma or living with daunting health issues, even learning a new language in one year may only be a dream.

They may feel like they are failing, and all you can do is support them in their disappointment and point out their achievements.

When the person(s) we have sponsored is not meeting expectations, ours or their own, it may be difficult to know what to do. Knowing when to step back is just as important as being willing to step up and help.

A healthy sponsorship is messy... you are taking a traumatized family and connecting them with a group of volunteers who “just want to help”. And, sometimes the best way to help is to do nothing at all.

Well-meaning volunteers can sometimes cause more harm than good when they disagree about what the next best steps may be. It can cause a great deal of stress when everyone has their own idea about what is best for the newcomer. If an individual acts on their own without consulting the rest of the group, it can cause a lot of friction and often confusion for the newcomer. Just like in parenting, a unified voice is always the best course of action.

Sometimes volunteers act in their own interests instead of the family's by creating dependency of the newcomer. Doing everything for another person instead of helping them learn to do things for themselves is not helping them at all. It may seem easier to just “do it for them”, but remember there is only a short 12 months to get them standing on their own.

We navigate these challenges to the best of our ability, connecting newcomers with professional help when needed. We share our experience and knowledge, encourage them to try things on their own, and then at some point, we let go.

Just like parenting, we won't do it perfectly, it's going to get messy, AND it's going to be OK.

If you have faced the challenges of gathering a group of people together to help another group of people learn to live in Canada, you have succeeded.
