How much should I pledge? Some people plan to contribute a percentage of their annual income. You will see examples on the "Giving

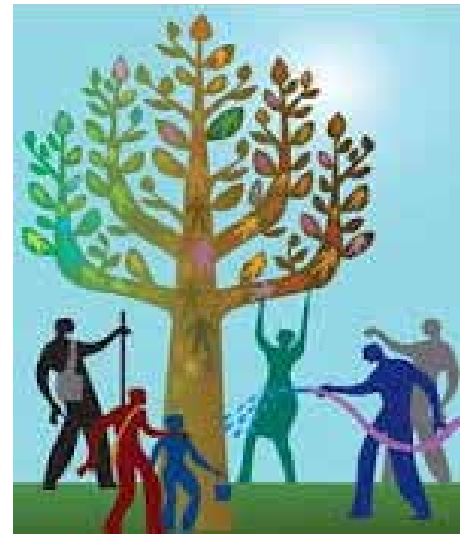
Chart”, which will be included in your pledge package, being emailed out on Tuesday October 9th.

What if my financial circumstances change during the year, if I lose my job or have a financial emergency?

So, if you know of a restaurant that allows you to bring your own containers for take-out, let me know! I'll keep track of stores that are selling cucumbers without the plastic wrap, or are stocking tooth powder in boxes or tins, as well as the standard toothpaste in plastic tubes... We already have two entries on our list: 'Vy's Pho' in Fort Langley allows people to bring their own take-out containers (thanks Joan M), & 'Better Meals' packages their frozen dinners in compostable containers (submitted by Jane S). As I write this, people all over the world are working to clean the beaches. The Great Canadian Shoreline Clean-up, the Canadian version, highlights the health of our oceans, lakes & rivers, an event that has been happening for 22 years! A common pollutant is plastic (wrapping, bags, containers, Styrofoam) and Greenpeace is collaborating on an initiative to inform the producers of the plastic that their product is polluting the environment. The plan is that this will force the manufacturers to reduce the plastic they use, change the packaging design, or use a compostable packaging material.

Religious Explorations

The theme for October is 'Growth' and in many ways the Beacon Board has tirelessly been working, with vision, for the growth and flourishing of our little Beacon community. I am most excited to share with you that there has been the creation of a support teacher position for the RE Sunday programs!! We are lucky enough to have both Eden and P.J. Patten to share the role of Religious Exploration Support Teacher. A big welcome to them both for stepping into this role!

This year in RE, the programming will focus on Unitarian Universalism—what it is, and our place in it. The *Signs of our Faith* curriculum suggests that we think about religion as the practice of being faithful to what we love. In order to do this, we must decide what we love and do our best to live that love faithfully every day. *Signs of Our Faith* guides children to do their best to live faithful lives every day. It presents fourteen traits or values that most Unitarian Universalists love, including the quest for knowledge, reverence for life, supporting

one another on our faith journeys, and public witness. Children examine how their lives do and can exhibit these traits and values, and come to understand that their faith is a living faith whose histories and teachings are fortifications for living faithfully in a complex world.

The youth will be working through curriculum called *A Place of Wholeness*, which explores the principles, values, and theologies of Unitarian Universalism. This will give them the opportunity to examine their faith journeys to better understand themselves in the context of Unitarian Universalism.

In addition, the youth will be partnering with North Shore Unitarian Church in the *Coming of Age* program. Through a series of work-

shops, the process of mentorship, and individual reflection, youth create their own religious/spiritual credo.

And finally we will continue to host Spirit Jams once a month in which members of the Beacon community are invited downstairs to share their skill, talent or passion with the whole RE. Each of these Sundays is a 'jam,' for example a gardening jam or a song composing jam. Want to Jam with us? Let Ashley know.

Tandi writes, preaches, and speaks widely about growth and religious innovation, and teaches Religious Education for a Changing World at Meadville-Lombard Theological School. She is a founder of the Growing Unitarian Universalism blog. Two of her meditations appear in *Becoming: A Spiritual Guide for Navigating Adulthood*, edited by Rev. Kayla Parker and *Restored to Sanity: Essays on the Twelve Steps by Unitarian Universalists*, edited by Ken and Cathlean. Tandi is especially passionate about congregational polity in the 21st century, covenant, faith formation and multigenerational communities. She is known for her creative reframing and sparky questions and love of collaboration. She is both ordained to the UU ministry and a Credentialed Religious Educator, master level.



Building Your Own Theology Part Two: Explore

Beginning with an introduction to the six sources of our UU faith, this program focuses on various theological questions to help participants understand and articulate their own belief system. Each class will examine key issues in religious inquiry such as truth and authority, theological diversity, spirituality, justice, suffering, death, immortality, and the idea of beloved community. This program builds on *Building Your Own Theology Part One*. It is not necessary to have done Part One to participate in Part Two.

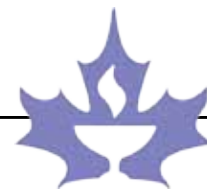
