

Mush-o-foam? NOT Styrofoam



We all come into contact with styrofoam as packaging for electronics, furniture or kitchen gadgets. When we are finished using it for packaging

it goes into the recycle bin (if we are lucky) or directly to the landfill where it can hang around for 10,000 years!

However, there is an alternative that can still protect our computers or TVs in transit but doesn't pollute the land or ocean—MUSHROOM MYCELIUM! Yes, we can grow an eco-friendly packaging material. Mycelium is the fibrous underground part of the mushroom and is an important part of nature's recycling system.

The way it works is: 1) start with an agricultural by-product, like oat husks, 2) prepare the husks by sterilizing them, 3) add mushroom spores that love to digest oat husks, 4) put the husks and the mushroom in a mold in the shape of the final packaging material, 5) wait a week for the mushroom mycelium to grow, 6) take the final packaging product out of the mold. The new material is tough, impact absorbing, fire resistant and light. And it can be thrown into the compost when we are finished using it!

Ikea is using 'Ecocradle' mushroom mycelium packaging materials; check out this short article https:// medium.com/wedonthavetime/ ikea-starts-using-biodegradablemushroom-based-packaging-for-itsproducts-42d079f98bb1.

Let's ask all our manufacturers to use mycelium packaging!


Celebrate New Year's Eve at Winter Eliot



Curious about energy healing?



Laura Redmond is taking the Integrative Energy Healing program at Langara College and requires volunteers to practise the treatment techniques she is learning. Here is a short description of what to expect:

Integratve Energy Healing (IEH) is an blend of ancient Eastern healing practices with Western scientific discoveries. Integral, whole-person approaches to wellbeing are the focus

of the program. What happens in an IEH session? Student practitioners conduct a short intake interview. The practitioners will do an assessment of your energy field (biofield), noting any imbalances. Then they work with your energy field by way of gentle hand placements on the body (or off the body, as you prefer). The sessions are usually 60 minutes and include a focus, one somatic-energetic holding treatment, and dialogue. Clients can be seated or lying down on a massage table. Most everyone will benefit from a session. Elderly clients have shorter sessions. Contact Laura at lauraredmond2@telus.net to set up an appointment.

ight you have heard that this year's Northern Lights project is fully funded? Fake news! In truth, while it has made progress in funding, the funding goal has not yet been met.

Financial support is needed and encouraged for *La Communauté Sans Frontières Unitarienne/Universaliste.* Under the leadership of Rev. Fulgence Ndagijimana, this project responds to the fact that most UU documents are in English and inaccessible to Francophones. It seeks to spread the good news of Unitarian Universalism IN FRENCH (for Canada and the rest of the world) by translating existing documents and centralizing them on a website. (Find out more about this project by re-reading the CUC's July enews.)

You can sign up to be a regular Chalice Lighter at https://cuc.ca/about-cuc/ support-subsidies/northern-lights/. You will then be invited by the project's hosting organization/congregation (in this case, the Saskatoon Unitarians) to make a donation.

Perhaps the wrong message has been spread because of all the good work that Rev. Fulgence is doing! In May, a Faithfy campaign in the United States funded a retreat for UU African Francophones. The Annual General Meeting (AGM) is scheduled for May 11, 2019 from 10:00 am–1:00 pm PT. Our host will be the Unitarian Congregation in Mississauga. There will be full capability for on-line virtual participation, as well as in-person participation.

Congregations are encouraged to select their online and in-person delegates early—delegates need to be registered by April 1. Congregations should plan to schedule at least one discussion and information session in February each year with their delegates and congregational members so that all are aware of matters going to the CUC AGM.

What's in a motion? Each

year, motions (motions don't become resolutions until after they are approved) are proposed for the AGM. Find out how to submit a motion and by when, who can submit motions, why a new motion may not be necessary, and a summary of previously approved motions on the CUC 's Resolutions page. If your congregation is considering submitting a motion, consult with the Executive Director BEFORE you submit a motion. This will save you time! Email executive director@cuc.ca. Motions are due by December 15.
