Message from your Ministerial Search Team

As you heard in mid-June, Beacon is welcoming a new minister as of August 1. We're delighted that Meg Roberts will be joining us in shared ministry. Here are some answers to some questions that might be bubbling up for you, followed by a message from our new minister:

1) What is a Congregational Record and what does ours say?

The Congregational Record is an in-depth document that provides detailed information about Beacon (from financials to history to programs that we offer). In this document, we outline the qualities of the minister we seek, and priorities for shared ministry. We sent this information to the UUA where it was made available to ministers-in-search. You may have also seen a shorter version posted on our website.

The information that we provided about Beacon's priorities and the minister that we seek came directly from the congregational conversation that we held in March and the subsequent on-line and e-mail surveys (for those who couldn't attend the conversation).

Our long list of priorities was a tall order and can't all be addressed at once. But we feel that we have found the minister who can support us to

move in the direction that we all decided was important for us.

2) Why a Contract Minister and not an Interim Minister?

Congregations seeking a minister for less than three quarter time aren't eligible for an Interim Minister. We quickly learned that this reality provided Beacon with the best of both worlds. We can hire a contract minister who will focus on transitional support in the first year. (Our new minister will be attending UUA Interim Training to support this direction.) At the same time, because we have hired a contract minister rather than an interim minister, we aren't required to seek a different minister after the one or two year interim period. After the first year, we can change the focus to other priorities, if mutually agreeable to both the congregation and the minister. (Beacon has operated on this year to year contract basis for the past seven years.)

3) Why half time?

Meg's offer was to work half time for Beacon. She proposed a detailed plan for how this could work for us. Drawing on her experience, she can help us prioritize and focus on our passions. She can also help us to identify what we may want to put aside for later. She

will help us look at our Shared Ministry structure so that we can realign where a minister's time is best spent and what work can be picked up by lay leadership. To help us transition to this model Meg has agreed to work some extra hours for September and October. Within this model Beacon could consider paying for a small amount of administrative support.

4) What are the top 5 reasons that we think Meg is an excellent choice for Beacon

- Seventeen years of experience at multiple congregations in Canada enables her to bring a depth of wisdom and a wealth of ideas to all of the situations that Beacon might encounter;
- Chair of *Truth, Healing and Reconciliation* Resource Team for the last five years provides her with a sensitivity to diverse needs and perspectives, and a cultural awareness lens to the work that she does in the community;
- Love of music and the arts
- Kind, thoughtful, exceptional listener
- Encourages us to cry and collects our Kleenex to put on a sacred fire!

Living with Less Plastic New West goes to City Hall!

On June 13th the *Less Plastic* team made a presentation to the Environment Advisory Committee of the City of New Westminster. We talked about the Congregation's commitment to reduce single use plastic and our current focus on plastics in the grocery store. Alternatives to plastic were discussed and we made our 'ask'. Our request was to ban single use plastic bags, plastic straws, plastic take-out containers & plastic cutlery. We also asked for Extended Producer Responsibility for plastic clamshells, plastic tubs and plastic wrap.

There were three plastics presentations that evening. Eventually (9:02 pm) the Advisory Committee passed a motion recommending that

Council prioritize an existing Council motion on banning plastic bags & straws, include styrofoam take out containers, and develop a work plan by the end of the 2019 fiscal year.

This was Debra's last official act with the *Living with Less Plastic* team, so it was good to see this phase of the

Settlement 2 NEWS FLASH! July 4th arrival!

Get your Criminal Record Check done in advance

We've heard that the rest of our refugee family will be arriving on July 4!! Mark your calendars now, so we can meet them at the airport (details to come).

Some time ago, many people said that they would help with this new addition to the family—the two sons, one with a wife, the other with a young child. **If you can help with some of the many tasks, you will need a criminal record check.**

You will need a letter from Beacon in order to get the criminal record check for volunteers. You can do it online in New Westminster, but only in person in Burnaby or Coquitlam. In Burnaby and Coquitlam it is still free for volunteers, but it now costs \$20.00 in New Westminster. If it is done online the letter will have to be scanned and attached to the application.

Minister Sees Opportunities in Congregational Collaboration

Central East region of the Unitarian Universalist Association, [Rev. Joan Van Becelaere](#) has worked with congregations large and small, but they’ve all had one thing in common: the opportunity to benefit from collaboration. Collaboration will be the focus of Van Becelaere’s one day online and in-person workshop “Serving With Spirit: Stronger Together, Planning for Partnership”, because she believes it’s not just an opportunity for congregations today, but a necessity.

“The truth of the matter is if we don’t collaborate and cooperate with each other, then we’re going to be suffering,” she says. “We’re not going to be able to meet people with what they need, we’re not going to be able

to maintain a stable congregational number, let alone grow.”

Van Becelaere doesn’t claim that collaborating with other congregations is a panacea for growth. But every congregation, she believes, has things they can both learn from and teach other congregations. Although the need to collaborate might seem more evident with smaller congregations, she believes members of larger ones will also benefit from the workshop by mutual learning and sharing.

“They have resources that they could share with the smaller ones,” she says. “Everybody’s got a strength – they will find that they’re surprised by what the smaller ones can share with them. Every church has a strength or else it wouldn’t exist.”

The workshop will lead participants through a process of determining their congregations’ strengths and weaknesses, looking at areas where they imagine collaboration would be helpful and then discussing the details of how this would work in practice. Van Becelaere has seen congregations share knowledge with each other as well as more practical things such as sheet music, bookkeeping services, and even bulk ordering toilet paper. The possibilities for collaboration, she believes, are virtually endless.
