An important update about ways to connect with me and how I'm working this coming month:

My carpal tunnel flare-up continues in both wrists. I'm working with good health practitioners to get it calmed down. While that is happening I'm limiting my time typing but I can still read emails and documents, and talk on the phone. I ask for your patience and understanding if some of my emails are brief. Let me know by phone if something is pressing and I'll get back to you as soon as I'm able. Also, driving impacts my wrists, so I'll be limiting that as well. I'll still be working, just in a different and slightly slower way right now. And as I'm working 1/2-time from home, here's how best to reach

- My regular Beacon days for meetings are Wednesdays and Thursdays. Depending on the Provincial Health Officer's Orders, I will be offering both emotional sup-

On those days I will be focusing on service preparations as well as doing other work. I will respond to emails and phone calls on those days as well.

is always a balance between what your heart says to contribute and what your pocket book says you can afford. We trust that your pledge will be the right pledge for you.

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

Coming Soon: the 2021 People's Ecochallenge! Join the MetroVan Unitarians!

n October 6th the People's Ecochallenge begins and will run for 21 days until October 27th. This is a great opportunity to learn about environmental issues, build new habits, be recognized for the good environmental work you do, and have fun with other members of our team!

The Challenge Actions are grouped in eleven categories: Justice for the Whole Community, Healing and Renewal, Waste, Food, Health, Transportation, Energy, Water, Simplicity, Community and Nature. Actions that you commit to can be daily, weekly, or one-time. They also vary in difficulty and are often accompanied by

learning resources such as articles or videos.

You can also earn points by indicating which actions you already do. Some examples are: 'say no to plastic straws', 'ditch the lawn', and 'support businesses owned by people of colour'.

We have created a team for the Lower Mainland Unitarians called MetroVan Unitarians and are welcoming participation from Beacon, South Fraser, North Shore and Vancouver Churches. In fact, we are welcoming anyone interested in joining our team!

Additionally, there will be an aspect of study on 'decolonizing environmentalism' where we will take

the opportunity, together, to learn about ourselves and this land. We are considering offering two or



n Religious Exploration, October's theme is both water and life. These are

take-away words from larger inspirations, with 'Water' being an elemental feature that has a lot to teach us and 'Life' referring to the 6th Unitarian Universalist source which is Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

The theme of water often sets the tone for an autumn return to Sunday services in Unitarian Universalist spaces through the ingathering water ceremony in September. And as we move into October, we reflect on how we ebb and flow as a community.

We at Beacon are navigating our own rhythms, trying new approaches to Sunday services and programming. Based on conversations I've had with families over the past couple of weeks it sounds as if many are excited to keep connecting through the physical mail-out program kits and, when possible, participating in special RE programs. However, they are less likely to attend Sunday services. With this in mind I will be focusing my energy on ensuring those who participate remotely feel connected and I will be suspending in-person programming until such a time as families feel safe and energetic about attending in person. There may be a special event or two (such as the night tree party) that we may aim to host in person/outside but that will be in conversations with families.

This month we are also invited to participate in the People's Ecochallenge which speaks exactly to celebrating the sacred circle of life with the aspiration to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature. I encourage all who are interested to sign up and participate in this fun interactive opportunity!

WORKSHOP SERIES—REGISTER BY OCT. 31ST

Understanding Deep Diversity and Learning to Identify and Shift our Racial Discrimination

Eight sessions, starting in December, facilitated by Rev. Meg Roberts

'e will be using Toronto-based educator Shakil Choudhury's book, Deep Diversity: A Compassionate, Scientific Approach to Achieving Racial Justice. The hardcopy and Kindle version launched on September 29 (an audio version will also be available). I invite you to join me in an 8-part workshop series learning about how to overcome the "us" versus "them" reaction that arises when we face difference. These practices can apply to various types of discrimination—we will focus on racial discrimination as we engage in anti-racism work. I highly recommend Shakil's approach and research; I took more in-depth training with him this summer and very much valued what I learned, and look forward to sharing it with you this fall and winter. From the book description: "Using a trauma-informed approach that removes shame or blame, he offers us the tools to recognize (systems of oppression), take authentic responsibility, and enact deep change. In easyto-absorb chapters, Choudhury interweaves research into the brain and studies on human behavior with hard-won lessons from his career of helping organizations and CEOs create more inclusive environments. He models vulnerability and mistakemaking, sharing examples of his own bias-missteps so readers are encouraged into their own racial justice journey without judgment." Here's what will make it possible for me to offer these sessions:

- A group of 8–15 people committed to attending the sessions. (If you have to miss a session because something pressing comes up, that's understandable.) We will meet every two weeks, starting the first week of December (day of the week and time to be determined once I know who is interested in attending).
- Reading a couple of chapters between sessions.
- Spending time reflecting on your reactions (thoughts, feelings, body response) as you read the book. We'll take time during each session for reflection as well.
- Bringing an open mind and heart, curiosity, compassion, and a willingness to be changed by what you are reading and sharing. The Book of Secrets by M.G. Vassanji (1994, 337 p.) Moderator: John Hagen Genre & Subjects: Canadian Fiction, Families, Immigrants, Race Relations

Awards: Scotiabank Giller Prize **Summary:** The Book of Secrets is a spellbinding novel of generations

and the sweep of history that begins in 1988 in Dar es Salaam, when the 1913 diary of a British colonial officer is found in a shopkeeper's back room. The diary inflames the curiosity of a retired schoolteacher, Pius Fernandes, whose obsession with the stories it contains gradually connects the past with the present. Inhabiting the story is a memorable cast of characters, part of an Asian community in East Africa, whose lives and fates we follow over the course of seven decades. Rich in detail and description, M. G. Vassanji's award-winning novel magnificently conjures setting and the realm of eras past as it explores the state of living in exile from one's home and from oneself. (Source: NWPL)

Franci Louann's *Argentina Poesia* (Ekstasis Editions) was published at the end of 2020. Soon we will have her *Argentina Two, Uruguay Too, Cuba Tambien* (156 pages, also published by Ekstasis). This will complete her collection of 'Spanglish' poemoirs—rapportage of her travels in Argentina, Uruguay and Cuba. The cost for each book is \$25 (or two books for \$40) including postage; or \$20 each, hand-delivered with a meetup.

Next we may anticipate *Portugal Calling*, which will include a large section titled *Loving Lisbon*. A final travel poetry collection would be *Oz and NZ*.
