Good news on Single Use Plastic!

sn't it frustrating that regulation of Single Use Plastics (SUP) moves so slowly? Don't you wish that all the Lower Mainland cities would have the same requirements? Well, there is some good news recently.

The province has issued a ministerial order that allows municipalities to implement bylaws against SUP use. The bylaws can restrict the use of 'polystyrene service ware' (plates, cups, bowls, trays, cartons or lidded containers), plastic straws (while maintaining the availability of 'accessible straws' in plastic), single-use check-out bags, or plastic utensils. There are also minimum amounts that are to be charged for recycled paper bags or reusable bags. Municipalities have to provide at least 6 month's notice of the bylaw going into effect but can't extend this notice beyond one year.



The province has issued a ministerial order that allows municipalities to implement bylaws against single use plastic.

In addition, MetroVancouver is working on a set of recommended measures for limiting the use of SUP, which should result in more consistency city to city!

Ecochallenge update

As of the 15th of October, about halfway through the Ecochallenge, our MetroVan

Unitarians Team has 18 members from Beacon and from the Unitarian Church of Vancouver. Together we have accumulated 2876 points, well above what the Beacon Team achieved last year. The impact so far includes reducing CO₂ by 5 pounds (2.3 kg), 105 meatless or vegan meals, 1902 minutes of exercise, and reducing water use by 144 gallons (476 liters). I chose four actions this year, so it is more manageable than last year!


Soul Matters Sharing Circles


Soul Matters Sharing Circle is a small group that meets once a month during our program year to explore and experience



The Company: the rise and fall of the Hudson's Bay Empire by Stephen R. Brown (2020, 486 p.)

Summary: A thrilling new telling of the story of modern Canada's origins. The story of the Hudson's Bay


Company, dramatic and adventurous and complex, is the story of modern Canada's creation. And yet it hasn't been told in a book for over thirty years, and never in such depth and vivid detail as in Stephen R. Bown's exciting new telling. The Company started out small in 1670, trading practical manufactured goods for furs with the Indigenous inhabitants of inland subarctic Canada. Controlled by a handful of English aristocrats, it expanded into a powerful political force that ruled the lives of many thousands of people-from the lowlands south and west of Hudson Bay, to the tundra, the great plains, the Rocky Mountains and the Pacific northwest. It transformed the culture and economy of many Indigenous groups and ended up as the most important political and economic force in northern and western North America. When the Company was faced with competition from French traders in the 1780s, the result was a bloody corporate battle, the coming of Governor George Simpson-one of the greatest villains in Canadian history-and the Company assuming political control and ruthless dominance. By the time its monopoly was rescinded after two hundred years, the Hudson's Bay Company had reworked the entire northern North American world. Stephen R. Bown has a scholar's profound knowledge and understanding of the Company's history, but wears his learning lightly in a narrative as compelling, and rich in well-drawn characters, as a page-turning novel."
