→ hese Congregational Conversations will open possibilities for the Beacon community and help create the future of Beacon. Each of the gatherings will last 1.5 hours and will be distinct. The In-Person Conversations will be held in New Westminster (Common room at the Vista 925 9th Street) on Saturday March 11, and Saturday April 1. These Conversations will begin at 10:30am, conclude at noon & be followed by a 30-minute lunch. The Zoom Conversations will take place on Wednesday March 15 and Wednesday April 5, start at 6:30pm and last 1.5 hours.

Each participant agrees to participate in both 1.5 hour discussions, EITHER the two in-person sessions or the two Zoom sessions. There are always emergencies and always pressing priorities, but the loss of even one person, for just one meeting, immensely reduces our chance of success.

We promise to have a conversation that we have not had before. We do not come to negotiate interests, share our stories or problem solve the past or the future. We will ask you to postpone problem-solving and making action plans;

those will come later. The first question you will be asked to reflect on is 'What brings you joy at Beacon?'.

No one will be asked in any way to yield on their commitments or interests. We are not coming to decide anything. We begin with the belief that the commitments and interests of each of us need to be honoured and considered by all.

- thinking deeply about Beacon,
- feeling a bit uncomfortable in the process and
- getting to know other Beacon members.

- criticize, shame or blame
- convince others of your viewpoint
- come up with brilliant ideas for others to implement.

For now, enjoy the spring including the rain "when the world is puddle-wonderful" according to e.e. cummings.





Permanent Astonishment: Growing up Cree in the Land of Snow and Sky, a Memoir by Tomson Highway c. 2021, 326 pages

Presenter: Susan Tarras

Summary: Capricious, big-hearted, joyful: an epic memoir from one of Canada's most acclaimed Indigenous

writers and performers. Tomson Highway was born in a snowbank on an island in the sub-Arctic, the 11th of 12 children in a nomadic, caribou-hunting Cree family who traversed the tundra by dogsled and lived off the land. In this book he animates the magical world of his northern childhood, paying tribute to a way of life that few have experienced and fewer still have chronicled. Growing up in a land of ten thousand lakes and islands, Tomson Highway relished being pulled by dogsled beneath a night sky alive with stars; sucking the juices from roasted muskrat tails; and singing country music songs with his impossibly beautiful older sister and her teenaged friends. Surrounded by the love of his family and the vast, mesmerizing landscape they called home, his was in many ways an idyllic far north childhood. But five of Tomson's siblings died in childhood, and Balazee and Joe Highway, who loved their surviving children profoundly, wanted their two youngest sons, Tomson and Rene, to enjoy opportunities as big as the

world. And so when Tomson was 6, he and Rene were flown south by float plane to attend a residential school and begin the rest of their education. In 1990 Rene Highway, a world-renowned dancer, died of an AIDS-related illness. *Permanent Astonishment* is Tomson's extravagant embrace of his younger brother's final words: "Don't mourn me, be joyful." Infused with joy and outrageous humour, *Permanent Astonishment* offers insights, both hilarious and profound, into the Cree experience of culture, conquest and survival. 
