


# **Summertime!**

## **Board Bitz**

he year 2025 has tested Beacon's spirit—and proven its strength. Through it all, the warmth of this community has never wavered.

In early May, the board made the difficult decision to not enter into a new contract with Rev. Meg Roberts for the 2025–26 church year. Rev. Meg joined us in 2019 and during her time with us has had to take two extended medical leaves. With Meg being accepted for long-term disability, it became uncertain when, or if, she might return. This uncertainty placed a strain on the Worship and Pastoral Care teams, and on the congregation as a whole.

After this decision was made and communicated, we were heartened when Rev. Meg, together with Rev. Karen Fraser-Gitlitz, offered to join us for our final service of the church year. Together, they led us in a *Ritual of Leave-Taking* to mark the end of Meg's covenant with Beacon. We are grateful for the time that Rev. Meg spent with us and wish her a full return to health. As is customary, there will be a one-year period of no contact between Rev. Meg and Beacon members to allow space for transition and clarity.

With every ending comes a new beginning. During this same service, after a moment of silence to honour the loss of congregants Sue Sparlin and Franci Louann, we welcomed eight new members into the Beacon community. Welcomed into our beloved Beacon community were



## With Love and Gratitude for Rev. Ev



Dr. Rev. F. Everett Morris July 31,1937–June 21, 2025

octor Rev. F. Everett Morris passed away Saturday, June 21 surrounded by his loved ones. He is survived by Joan, his wife of 25 years; his sons Dave and TR, grandchild K; Joan's daughters, Jeneen (Derrick Bayer and their sons Jayden and Ryan), and Kira (Dean Auger and their four children: Caleb, Theo, Matthias, Sophia).

He died at home after a ten-year struggle with Parkinsonism. Ev's long athletic career of marathon running, tennis matches, and a late golf addiction provided him with great strength and endurance in his last years. Joan's excellent and loving care allowed him to live out his days at home, and he passed away there surrounded by family.

Rev. Ev was Beacon's minister from 1998–2002. He was known for his thoughtful and insightful sermons. He founded "The Lunch Bunch" with engaging discussions from *Friedman's Fables*. Members of that group continue to meet.

Ev was born and raised in Spokane, Washington, and was an engineering professor for 20 years. Before that career he spent two years working with the Peace Corps in Peru with his first wife, Beth. Back in the U.S. they settled in Ames, Iowa where he earned his engineering PhD. His sons were born in Iowa before the family moved to Youngstown, Ohio for Ev's first faculty job.

After eight years in the midwest they moved to Spokane, Ev's childhood home. After a divorce he moved to California where he attended Starr King Unitarian Seminary in Berkley, CA. Ev was first called to be a minister in Reading, Pennsylvania, and after five years came to Beacon.

Ev and Joan were married in 2000 during his Beacon ministry. After his retirement Ev did occasional services for other congregations in the Lower Mainland. In his free time he played golf, walked his dog Casey, took trips with Joan, and wrote two small books of poetry, sermons, and life philosophy.

He is missed.

A Celebration of Life will be held later in August or early September.

# **Beacon Implementation Team Report for June & July**

he team consists of Peg Hinkley, Susan Tarras, Phil Campbell, Deepak Sahasrabudhe and Teresa Morton. Guests Dominique Mamisao and Cathy Burpee have agreed to remain on the team through August!

The team frequently refers to the four action plans that the congregation prepared, to make sure our activities are consistent with the plans for community, spirituality, outreach and music.

As Rev. Meg takes leave of Beacon in June of 2025, our transition to

a community-led congregation for 2025–26 is at the front of our minds. We know that the board will be setting in motion consultations with the congregation, and Implementation Team members will be invited to play a role in the CONSULTATIONS TEAM.

The Implementation Team is continuing to make progress in the following areas: improving the audio at Sapperton, working out back-up plans for the Service Tech Team, parking availability, community building through music, formalizing feedback

processes, and website/social media upgrades.

Our Beacon Music Jams are on hold for the summer (July and August) and then will resume on the second Thursday of the month in September. We have 12–15 Beacon members participating. All are welcome! The Team is also working with Worship Services Team to facilitate the pre-service sing-alongs.



# **Environment News, Wildfires**

t our June 8th Envirobee discussion, the wildfires were a 'hot topic'. I've collected a couple of references that may be useful.

- For a central source of wildfire information, use the Canadian government site 'wildfires' (https://www.canada.ca/en/publicsafety-canada/campaigns/wildfires. html), which includes links to the provincial wildfire maps, information on wildfire smoke distribution, and background data.
- For fire prevention and mitigation, Firesmart programs are front & centre. Firesmart BC (firesmartbc. ca) has prevention and mitigation measures for homeowners and communities.
- A local source of information is Fire Prevention in Coquitlam (<u>FirePre-vention@Coquitlam.ca</u>)
- And a Canadian perspective can be found in the book Fire Weather.
   Fire Weather: A True Story from

a Hotter World (also published as Fire Weather: On the Front Lines of a Burning World) is a 2023 book by Canadian-American journalist John Vaillant. The book details the
